

FUNDING SUCCESS: Use of fire as a tool to manage native pastures- An Indigenous Perspective



In 2011, Professor Bill Gammage released his book *"The Biggest Estate on Earth – How Aborigines made Australia"*. He was recently featured on ABC TV Landline. You can view the segment "Fire Power" at: <u>http://www.abc.net.au/landline/content/2013/s3767527.htm</u>

Bill's award-winning book examines written and visual records of the Australian landscape and uncovers a complex system of indigenous land management using fire and the life cycles of native plants to ensure plentiful wildlife and plant foods throughout the year.

In partnership with the Indigenous engagement unit at North East CMA, Kiewa Catchment Landcare has received funding to establish three native pasture trial sites where we will undertake burns and measure the differences between controls and treatments. The project is funded through the Caring for our Country agricultural stream, so the focus will be on native grasses as pastures. In agricultural grazing systems, native grasses can offer a range of benefits:

- Native grasses are mostly perennials and persist well in the Australian environment;
- Some have nutritive characteristics similar to introduced pasture species;
- They can cope with adverse climate conditions such as droughts, heavy rains and frosts;
- Many tolerate low fertility, acid soils, water stress and are more resistant to disease;
- Different native species such as warm season or cool season grasses have growth periods at different times of the year, providing the potential for year-round green feed;
- Generally they have dense tillers and roots that hold the soil and allow increased use of soil moisture to help prevent soil erosion and nutrient runoff;
- They can provide a lower input grazing system, reducing the dependence on finite resources;
- They provide for integrated pest management and native biodiversity.

LANDCARE GETS INVOLVED IN STUDENT ENVIROMENT DAY





Students had the opportunity to learn about native birds and the plants that support them at a Student Environment Day held at the Cube in August.

Students potted up Ovens wattle and River bottle brush and completed a bird identification exercise. Many thanks to Rowan and Julie for helping out.

DUNG BEETLE SOIL CORE TRIALS AT LUCYVALE REVEALS SIGNIFICANT RESULTS

In March 2011 Chips set up 20 dung beetle plots using the dung beetle *Geotrupes spiniger*. To each plot he added 50 beetles and six litres of cattle dung over a six-week period. *G. spiniger* construct tunnels under the dung which are generally deeper than 200mm. In May 2013, with assistance from the NECMA Soil Carbon Project, one metre soil cores were taken from ten beetle plots and ten adjacent control plots. The cores taken from the beetle plots had plant roots to a depth of 900mm and earthworm activity at 550mm. The soil for three depths were aggregated and sent for chemical analysis. A statistical analysis found significant results for Phosphorus (P) (p = 0.021).

The pH (CaCl2) for each depth was consistently higher for the dung beetle soil samples,

The Organic Carbon (C) at the two lower soil depths was higher for the dung beetle soil samples

Also of interest was the decrease in Aluminium (Al) levels in the beetle soil samples. Given the acid soils in NE Victoria, this is a very welcome finding. With the assistance of Kiewa Catchment

Landcare and NECMA, Chips will conduct further chemical and microbial tests with a larger sample size in Spring 2013. Congratulations are extended to Chips for taking the initiative and setting up these trials at his property at Lucyvale.
