INDIGENOUS USE OF FIRE FORUM: *Packed house at La Trobe University*



We were overwhelmed with the response to the Indigenous Use of fire forum, with over 155 people attending. Participants came from four states and were from a diverse range, including Landcare, DEPI, CFA, Parks Victoria, Local government, Indigenous communities, philanthropic trusts and various not for profit environmental organisations. We were also delighted to have all of the State regional "Planned Burning Officers" attend.



We began with a Welcome to Country by Donna Mitsch and welcome by Jeff Taylor from North East CMA. Our speakers were, Peta Standley from Cape York, Dr Fred Cahir, Dr Beth Gott and Professor Bill Gammage. Each provided us with insights into how Aborigines used fire to shape and manage our landscape.



Australian Farmers – *Our farmers provide more than just food - Results of National Landcare Survey*



A recent survey by National Landcare of 500 farmers from a diverse range of industries found that Farmers have consistently ranked pest and weed control as their top Landcare issues. The total average spend per farm over the last 12 months on pest & weed control was \$20 640 (\$15 756 weeds and \$4 884 for pests). With 89% of farmers saying that they undertake weed control and 74% undertaking pest control. This equates to a national annual expenditure (based on 2011-12 ABS figures of numbers of Australian farms as 135 692), by farmers of approximately \$2.38 billion. BARANDUDA: *Exciting new find of Swainsona sericea at Baranduda – by Tony Marsh*



On Nov 23, Johno and I went up the range for the annual collection of pods from the known *Swainsona sericea* plants (about 24). The road had been graded and there was a bit of confusion about where to park - we ended up parking about 100 metres from our normal location - a stroke of luck as it turned out.

We checked September-flowering plants, pods were scarce so we headed back. Nearly back at the car, eagle-eyed Johno spotted a small *Swainsona sericea* and elated we searched some more, and I found another one. We GPS'd and recorded data. It was getting late and we decided to call it quits.

Just as we were at the car, Johno suggested we look on the south (high) side of the road that had been burnt in autumn 2012. To our amazement, we found another patch of plants with pods as well as a number of individual plants. We collected 50 pods and recorded locations. This almost doubles the number of known plants. And most significantly, it reassures us that the fuel reduction burn planned next autumn is likely to deliver more positive outcomes for this plant we have been monitoring for the last 6 years. **Photo: Pods of the "vulnerable" *Swainsona sericea*- (Photo Tony Marsh)**

KIEWA-BONEGILLA – Field trip to Bonegilla Grasslands



A small group from the fire forum visited the Bonegilla grasslands reserve and were most impressed. DEPI has conducted controlled burns at the site: "*The burn will help protect and enhance the native grassland community, in particular it will reduce Kangaroo Grass competition and open-up inter-tussock spaces to benefit a diversity of wildflowers including two threatened grassland orchid species,*" – Quote from Glen Johnson – taken from DEPI website

UPPER KIEWA: Revegetation Trials at Bohuns Lane, Upper Gundowring



The latest working bee at Bohun Lane Revegetation trials involved planting out a steep bank. Soil saving mesh was used to cover the banks, into which the plants were placed. Damp shredded paper was placed around each plant to block out light and prevent weeds. Mulch was placed between the mesh and the soil. Samples of soil were taken for a germination test. The test will provide data on the number and type of weeds in the soil bank.

LUCYVALE DUNG BEETLE TRIALS: – October soil test results show consistent long-term effects

In October this year, with the assistance of Simon Feillafe, we took a further 10 soils tests (at three depths = 30 samples) from the control (5) and dung beetle plots (5). Once again the figures have come back very positive. It has now been two and a half years since the beetles were placed in the plots. These figures demonstrate that the changes dung beetles make to the soil have long lasting benefits. Samples have also been submitted for microbiological tests.

We would also like to extend our congratulations to Chips Boucher, who was awarded the *DEPI Innovation in Sustainable Farm Practices Award* for his ongoing commitment to dung beetle research. A very worthwhile winner!

BIOLOGICAL CONTROL OF WEEDS – Map your findings on ATLAS of Australia

The Biological Weed Control Portal aims to centralise information on the known distribution, availability and redistribution methods of weed biological control agents in south eastern Australia. The site is interactive and enables anyone to record,

map and download biological weed control agent sightings. There is also a comprehensive field guide of biological control agents to enhance recognition and there are links to many other resources.

There are three main sections to the portal:

Section 1: Accessing weed/biological control agent information

Section 2: Accessing maps of biological control agent distributions

Section 3: Recording a biological control agent observation

This is a great opportunity to share information.

TREE POPPERS AVAILABLE FOR REMOVAL OF WOODY WEEDS – A non-chemical alternative



Kiewa Catchment Landcare Groups have purchased three “Tree Poppers” (small, medium and large), that are available for use by members. The Tree Popper is a robust, uncomplicated tool which can be used by one person. It uses a simple concept of leverage to ensure the complete removal of unwanted vegetation.

Manufactured from mild steel, the Tree Popper comprises a lever/handle with a rubber grip and a foot piece firmly held together by a circlip. These two basic parts form a plier-like jaw which is used to grip the plant stem. Pushing down on the handle exerts leverage pressure on the tree and pops it out of the ground. The large popper has a x10 leveraging effect, producing a pulling power of 10 times your body weight.
